The British Columbia Archives Action Group was formed at the B.C. Studies Conference in 1997 as a lobby group both for the Archives with regard to the provincial government and for archives users vis-à-vis the Archives itself. The Canadian Families Project team has now completed its national sample of the 1901 census of Canada (Schedules 1 and 2) and will be presenting results at various conferences in the coming year. This database will be released as a public use sample in three years' time. The team at University of Victoria now includes Lisa Dillon as a post-doctoral fellow. The team (P. Baskerville, B. Conceived as a multi-phase project, the Hugh MacLennan Online project will eventually provide access to MacLennan's voluminous correspondence and unpublished and published manuscripts. The first phase of the project provides access electronically via the World Wide Web to McGill's Department of Rare Books and Special Collections' finding aid and also a name index to the author's correspondence. The next phase of the project will involve the scanning of original letters and manuscripts and the creation of a searchable full-text database. Victoria: The B.C. Archives web site had more than 2.4 million items accessed by people from 92 countries during 1997, Dan Miller, Minister for Information, Science and Technology (British Columbia) said recently. This is double the number of items accessed in 1996. British Columbia Archives is the central archives service for the government of British Columbia and provides research access to records of enduring value for the provincial government and public clientele. One of its searchable databases consists of information about B.C. marriage registrations for the years 1872 to 1976. The Archives also continues to build its visual records database and more than 12,400 high-resolution scans of historical photographs were added in 1997. A searchable database provides direct links to the on-line images so that clients can view and print the image. The B.C.
