ANNOUNCING H-CANADA

Announcing H-Canada, an international electronic discussion group set up and run by H-Net, Humanities On-Line, and sponsored by the Canadian Committee on History and Computing, a committee of the Canadian Historical Association. The purpose of H-Canada is to provide a forum for discussing the history of Canada and other related subjects (sociology, political studies, literature, women's studies, Canadian studies etc).

There are no chronological or topical limits. H-Canada is a bilingual (French and English) discussion list. Messages are posted in the language in which they were sent. Subscription is free, and subscribers will automatically receive messages in their computer mailboxes. Messages can be saved, discarded, copied, printed out, or relayed to someone else. It is like a daily newsletter or an ongoing, moderated "roundtable" discussion.

Primary Purpose

The primary purpose of H-Canada is to stimulate dialogue among scholars who study Canadian history and related disciplines. H-Canada enables scholars to communicate current research and research interests; discuss new articles, books, papers, approaches, methods, and tools of analysis; test new ideas, and share comments and tips on teaching.

Co-Editors

H-Canada is co-edited by associate Professor Dave De Brou of the University of Saskatchewan (debrou@duke.usask.ca) and Tony Gulig, Ph.D. candidate in Canadian history at the University of Saskatchewan (gulig@duke.usask.ca). H-

Canada has an editorial board, broadly representative of the state of scholarship, which sets policy and advises the editors.

Dialogues in Canadian History

H-Canada publishes syllabi, outlines, handouts, bibliographies, guides to term papers, listings of new sources, library catalogues and archives, and reports on new software, datasets and cd-roms. H-Canada also posts announcements of fellowships conferences, and jobs. Subscribers write in with questions, comments, and reports. H-Canada carries announcements from publishers of new books, and commissions book reviews. H-Canada actively seeks participation by textbook publishers, whose editors can join with text authors to shape the next edition of the textbook teachers will be using.

An Edited List

H-Canada will be completely non-partisan. All submissions must be approved by the editors, who will reject flames, irrelevant material, or items that do not further the scholarly dialogue. Complaints raised by subscribers will be reviewed by the editorial board, who will advise the editors. The decisions of the editors will be final.

H-Canada is edited to filter out extraneous messages (like requests for subscription) and items that do not belong on the list. The editors will not alter the meaning of a message, but will, if necessary, add name and e-address and modify the subject line of a post.

Send this e-mail message via the INTERNET to LISTSERV@msu.edu: Sub H-Canada firstname surname, school, language of communication.

You put your own first name, last name, the name of your school, and the preferred language of communication (French or English). In the place of "firstname", "surname", "school", and "language of communication."

For example: sub H-Canada Leslie Jones, Northern University, English.

If you have access to BITNET and not the Internet, the same message goes to LISTSERV@MSU [capital or lower case does not matter, but spelling does. Note "LISTSERV"].
